But have you heard of PTSG? Post Traumatic Stress Growth.

I recently heard a talk from a lady who'd lost her husband unexpectedly at a very young age. But over time she came to see the concept of PTSG. It's the concept that the terrible things that happen to us could actually be the source of huge personal growth and development and not just pain. This is not to minimise the horror of whatever has happened, but to choose to let it be a source of progress and development rather than a cause of decline and despair.

We understand this concept in the world of physiology with our bodies. If you want to develop strong powerful muscles, you need to push them. You work hard, you sweat, you keep going until it hurts, you ache the next day and you still go back and do it all again.

Personal trainers are popular but having one could never exactly be described as fun! Does anyone really enjoy 50 press ups in the park at 7am? Maybe they do... But the positive effect for our bodies and our whole lives as a result, is impressive. Look at the punishing regimes of our top athletes. They all know that popular slogan 'No Pain, No Gain' from first hand experience. Their success depends on their willingness to embrace demanding hard work and pain as something that will ultimately work for their good. Without stress our bodies wither and we fade away.

It's the concept that the terrible things that happen to us could actually be the source of huge personal growth and development and not just pain.

And yet how often in our personal lives do we try and live in a different way, as if all pain and stress is only bad. How often do we see difficult situations simply as something awful to be avoided at all costs? And when

bad things do inevitably happen, we only see the negative side of what is going on and the temptation is to complain bitterly and ask, "why me?".

Maybe there is another perspective. Perhaps we might investigate this concept of PTSG. Maybe we need to look up and embrace the growth possibilities that the strain and stress provide. What is it doing to our characters? Where is it bringing depth to new relationships? How is it enabling us to bless and help others?

Pop psychology would tell us to look for the silver lining in every cloud – Christian theology would remind us that the ultimate good came through the ultimate suffering of Jesus. Take your pick – but why not take up the challenge of PTSG – you never know where it might lead...

We MOT our cars, but do we MOT ourselves?

of our 24/7 culture can produce a relentlessly busy lifestyle.

Princes William and Harry have stoically promoted mental health awareness in recent years, encouraging people to talk about their emotions. They have been supported by famous footballers, trying to encourage young men, in particular, to talk about their emotions associated with grief, depression and anxiety. Perhaps their promotion has added to an increased demand for private counselling? There are fantastic charities offering free counselling for certain issues, such as bereavement, yet there is often no funding from the government or NHS, and one local agency, South West Surrey Cruse, for example, relies on fund-raising and donations to continue to operate, with all volunteers giving their time for free. Charities are sadly not able to offer free counselling for every need.

So how does counselling work? How does talking about our problems, some of which may be historic experiences that cannot be 'unexperienced', actually make a difference? Many people do not want to overly burden their friends, and find that speaking to a stranger, for whom they have no reciprocal responsibility, is incredibly useful. I liken counselling to that dreaded pile of letters, bills or uncompleted forms that lurks in many homes, waiting to be dealt with. When you start to sort through, some items can be 'binned' immediately, because they are out of date and you realise they don't matter anymore. Some items need to be dealt with now, so that life can continue more efficiently, and you can work through these, simply because you are giving the time to the job. Some of the papers can return to the pile on the kitchen counter, because they can't be dealt with vet. However the pile is now smaller. You know what is in the pile now, and

being smaller, it may feel slightly less overwhelming.

Counselling offers the chance to work through problems with someone alongside you who is actively and empathically listening. But whether we use counsellors, close friends, family, colleagues or support groups, let's not be afraid to talk about it.

Children will love making, and eating, these frozen yoghurt and compote lollies. They're ideal as a special holiday treat.

Ingredients (makes 6 lollies)

- 60g toasted toffee granola
- 2 tbsp Bonne Maman Salted Caramel
- 300g fat-free, thick-set natural yoghurt
- 200g Bonne Maman Cherry, Apricot or Rhubarb Compote

Method

- 1. In a small bowl, mix the granola with the caramel and stir well to combine.
- 2. Spoon the mixture into the bottom of 6 ice-lolly moulds and press down firmly with the handle of a wooden spoon.
- 3. Add alternate dollops of yoghurt and compote. Insert a lolly stick into each and freeze overnight until firm.

For a dairy-free alternative, purée the compote with a little fresh orange juice and make compote-only lollies. If you don't have custom-made lolly moulds, then most small freezer-proof containers will do the job. Just pop a lolly stick into the mix and freeze in the same way as with proper moulds. When you take them out of the freezer, run the outside of the container under hot water to release the lolly.

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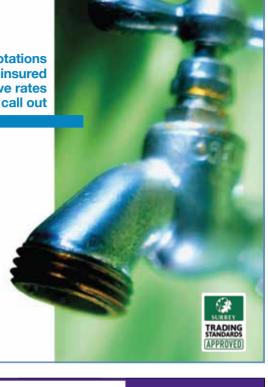

Some leave directions in their wills about their animals and consider leaving a pot of cash behind for the person willing to take on the responsibility for caring and loving their beloved pet. These costs can be quite high as we are not only talking about feeding and watering them but also covering insurance and/ or vets bills and the odd toy or treat.

There are also charities that are willing to help when the need arises and again this can be covered in your will. I know of a few organisations with whom you can register during your lifetime to request they take over looking after you pets if you are no longer able to do so e.g. you are terminally ill, unable to have the pet as you have moved into care and pets are not allowed in that care home or you have died. These organisations do not demand you donate but are of course hoping you will provide some kind of cash sum either in your lifetime or in your will.

In some instances, you may be able to keep your pet with you if you enter a care home. Mainly they are allowed if you can show that you can still care for the animal yourself.

By 1938 there were 29 teams, of both men and women, including The Kingpost, which was only in the league for one year. Inevitably the war interrupted the sport's progress, but from the 1950s onward it grew in popularly. The Burpham club started in 1966 and was in the league for 17 years. In the 1960s Derek Oliver and his sister, Christine Raggett, won tournaments in tennis and table tennis. Their father, Police Constable Fred Oliver, played and coached both tennis and table tennis locally, and was responsible for identifying the potential of the Howard sisters.

Susan and Linda Howard, daughters of Percy Howard, the Burpham builder,

were introduced to the sport by Fred during a rain break at a tennis coaching session, and it was clear that they were going to be great players. Their father built a table tennis room, to county standard, in their back garden in Burpham and some of the Guildford League matches were played there, others being played in the Burpham Cricket Pavilion in Sutherland Memorial Park. The girls moved on to be coached by the Surrey Coach in Sutton, and in due course became top UK players. They played in both singles and, together, in doubles matches. They were still involved in table tennis in 2008.

There was a social side to the sport, with regular dinner dances and awards ceremonies. Burpham had more than one team and often vied with other clubs to gain the titles. In the mid-1970s Burpham was at the top of its game, winning the Premier Division, the Percy Lawes Cup and the Handicap Cup.

David Wellsman won the Open Singles and Sue Roebucks won the Ladies' Title. By this time there were 150 teams, in 13 divisions, in the GTTA. Burpham continued to win cups and titles and a training scheme was started at George Abbot School. In the 1980s Trevor Free was a star attraction for the Burpham club, but the Merrow club was growing and winning at various levels. In the early 1980s the Burpham club seems to have closed and there is now no Burpham club in the GTTA. Perhaps Burpham players now play for other clubs?

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Why technology can be a pain in the neck for teenagers!

A recent report from the British Chiropractic Association (BCA) suggests that teenagers are at risk from suffering with back or neck pain due to sedentary lifestyles associated with excessive technology use.

Findings from the report, identified that 40% of the age group studied (11 to 16-year olds) have experienced back or neck pain and around 15% of parents believe the pain is a result of using electronic devices. The research also showed that 68% of the age group spend 1 to 4 hours per day on either a laptop, tablet or PC; and a resounding 73% 1 to 6 hours! The study went on to stay that 38% of parents believed their children spend 1 to 6 hours a day on their mobile phone.

Young people are spending more time on games consoles than riding a bike. When parents were asked how much time their teenager spends on their bicycle, 21% claimed that they didn't have one.

Nearly half of parents questioned, acknowledged that their children don't spend enough time exercising, despite NHS guidelines stating that children and young people between 5 & 18 years old need to do at least one hour of physical activity every day.

At Guildford Chiropractic Centre, we have noticed a rise in the number of young Guildford people coming to us with back and neck pain. We also believe that as youngsters become increasingly sedentary they are damaging their posture. There is the tendency to sit in a hunched position when working on electronic devices which puts a lot of strain on the spine.

An initiative promoted by the BCA suggests parents limit time children spend using technology and encourage more active recreation, particularly around the Summer holidays.

Learning to sit properly and keep active will help young people remain healthy and pain free. It's important that parents seek help for their children from an expert, such as a chiropractor, as soon as any pain starts – if conditions are left untreated it could lead to chronic back and neck problems in later life.

The BCA offers the following top tips for parents to help their teenagers reduce the risks of back and neck pain:

- Move, move and move: The fitter children are, the
 more their backs can withstand periods of sitting still.
 To increase fitness levels, you can do activities including
 walking to school, riding a bike or going for a run.
- Teach them how to sit: It's important that children learn the correct way to sit when using a computer. Keep arms relaxed and close to the body or on the desk when typing. Eyebrows level with the top of the screen and chair titled

slightly forward, so knees are lower than the hips and feet flat on the floor. Using a laptop or tablet away from a desk will encourage poor posture, so limit time spent in this way.

- Don't sit still for too long: Make sure children take a
 break from the position they're sitting in on a regular basis
 and stretch their arms, shrug their shoulders and move their
 fingers around this helps to keep the muscles more relaxed.
- Lead by example: Maintaining good posture and promoting good spinal health is something that everyone should be doing, adults and children alike. If you make it a priority, it's easier for your children to see the relevance.
- Seek medical advice: Seek professional advice if your child is experiencing pain lasting for more than a few days.
 If your child wants to be more active, check that there are no medical reasons why they should not exercise, particularly if they are not normally physically active.



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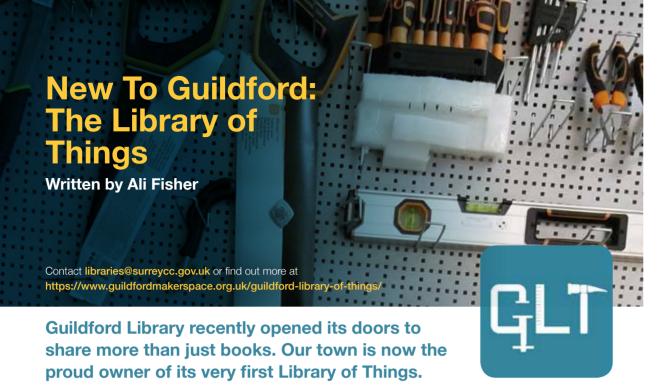
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Guildford Library of Things launched in 2018 as a collaboration between Surrey County Council, Guildford Borough Council, Suez Recycling and Recovery UK.

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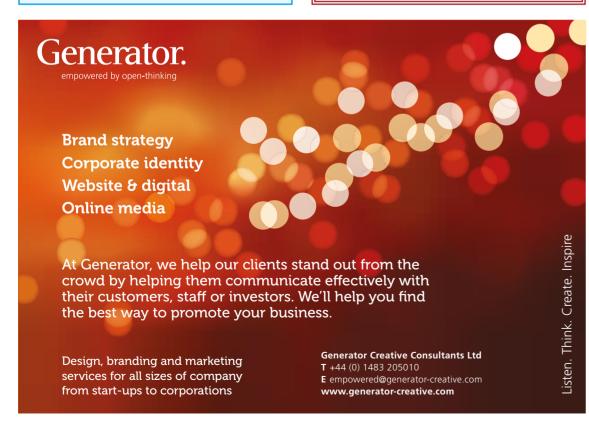

Things to do in the garden in July.

- Remove the main stem of Cordon Tomatoes just above the fourth truss to stop the plant producing fruit which will not mature before the winter sets in. Blossom End Rot on Tomatoes is caused by irregular watering, a regular feed of Tomorite will help Tomatoes and Dahlias produce good fruit and flowers, start feeding Tomatoes as soon as the first fruits begin to form.
- Continue to make successional sowings of Salad Crops.
- Regularly pick Courgettes unless you want them to become

- Marrows, Beans will become tough and stringy unless they also are picked frequently.
- Leeks and Winter Brassicias should be planted out.
- Spray Potatoes and Tomatoes when it is wet and muggy to prevent Blight.
- Summer Prune Plum Trees after harvesting.
- Give Summer Bedding plants and containerised plants a regular liquid feed.
- Dead head Roses, Perennials and Bedding plants to maintain their flowering display.
- Continue to control Green Fly and Black Fly.

Now that all the hard work is done it is time to enjoy your garden which should be at the peak of perfection.

Things to do in the garden in August.

- Now that all the hard work is done it is time to enjoy your garden which should be at the peak of perfection.
- Continue to harvest fast growing

- Vegetables and Salad crops.
- Keep Runner Beans well watered to encourage the flowers to set fruit.
- Cut back hardy Geraniums to encourage new growth and successful flowering next year.
- Continue to dead head Bedding Plants to ensure a good display, repeat flowering Perennials should also be dead headed to encourage a second flush of bloom.
- Rambling Roses should be pruned after flowering, cutting out one in three stems from the base to encourage new growth.
- Complete the division of Bearded Iris.
- Start indoor Cyclamen into growth.
- Continue to Summer prune Wisteria removing all new shoots to five or six buds from the main stem.
- Take cuttings of Buddleia, Hydrangeas and Pyracantha.
- Set traps among the Dahlias to control Earwig damage, fill a 3" pot with straw and place it upside down on the cane supporting the plant, the Earwig will climb into the pot during the night and it will wait for you to shake it out into a dish in the morning for disposal.
