

Four Guildfordian athletes took part in the Tokyo 2021 Olympics, team GB's second-best Olympic games ever.

Although Alicia Wilson, of Guildford City Swimming Club, made her Olympic debut by reaching the final of the women's 200m medley this year, the most successful of the four was Liam Heath MBE. Tokyo was sprint canoeist Liam's third Olympic Games. Going into this year's Olympics, he had already won sprint bronze in the K2 200m beside Jon Schofield in London 2012, silver in the same event in 2016. and gold that year in Rio's individual 200m kayak sprint event.

Liam Heath MBE was born and raised in Guildford and attended George Abbot School. He was introduced to kayaking for the first time when he was 10, on a 'holiday fun' activity week at the Wey Kayak Club in Guildford, where he instantly clicked with the sport. He went on to train with them, competing as a junior, learning quickly and training hard.

Wey Kayak Club is one of the top kayak clubs in the UK, catering for beginners through to international-level canoeists, and it is where young Liam spent much of his time. This served him well, and at the age of 25, he was invited to train with the GB sprint canoe team. After winning his first three medals, he sealed his title as an Olympic legend

as saying "It's hard to put into words, it's what you're working towards, to be at your best for these events and I've learned so much along my journey. You learn more about yourself, your competitors and the people you work with day in, day out. It's them working tirelessly behind the scenes which provides the support for me to be able to achieve my dreams. A massive thanks to everybody that's watching at home. Not guite the gold, but I'm happy with my performance so I hope you guys can be happy too."

Hannah was born with a vision impairment and took up swimming at the age of five with Woking Swimming Club, before moving to Guildford City Swimming Club at the age of 12. After winning double bronze and a silver in London 2012 and double bronze and a gold at Rio 2016, she plans to compete in three events in Tokyo, the S12 100m backstroke, the S12 100m freestyle and the S13 50m freestyle.

Well, Mandira and her dedicated team haven't been standing still whilst in lockdown and have been creating new experiences as well as new recipes and have now launched their 'Chai On The Patio' offering.


This new addition to Mandira's Kitchen provides the most delicious spot to enjoy fabulous Indian street food. Beautifully positioned, they have five tables of six which can be booked for slots of one hour (or more) where you can catch up with family & friends over some delicious food and drink. Each 1 hour slot costs £20 and is fully redeemable against any purchases you make on your visit.

They have an exciting street food menu – which you can order at the time of your booking, plus you can always add more dishes when you get there.

Walk-ins are welcome, but booking is advisable especially for busy times and weekends. The menu is also designed to be a takeaway should you wish to enjoy elsewhere.

Talking to Mandira she clearly has missed the freedom recently to visit home but we are fortunate that she is happy to recreate the taste of home here to share with us. "Summer seems to have passed

us by but I still consider myself so lucky to be in beautiful Burpham during these uncertain times. We have the ancient Medieval town with every modern amenity within walking distance as well as the stunning Surrey hills on our doorstep too – the best of both worlds. Not being able to travel to India to see my family and eat at our favourite restaurants, I have tried to recreate many of my favourite dishes and here is one to share with you. Perfect with a cup of chai or a class of wine or gin or beer...





Ingredients (makes 15 medium sized pakoras): To make these delicious

To make these delicious morsels you will need:

- 2 large red onions sliced
- · A bag of baby spinach, chopped
- Approx. 2 heaped tablespoons of gram flour (besan)
- 1 heaped tablespoon of rice flour (optional – can substitute with self raising flour if you want)
- · Salt to taste
- 1½ tsp chilli powder
- 1 level tsp chilli powder,
- 1 finely sliced green chilli
- 1 tsp of coriander seeds, roughly ground – you need to be able to bite into these
- Oil (enough to cover your pan to the depth of an inch)
- Cold water (alternatively you can use beer)

Method:

- Tip all the ingredients, except the water (or beer) and oil into a large mixing bowl.
- 2 Add about 3 tbsp water (or beer) to start with and gently try and bring together. The mixture should hold but not get too thick or doughy – the secret to light fluffy pakoras is not too much gram flour. If you find you need a little more binding then add gram flour and if it is too dry add a tiny bit more water (or beer).
- 3 Let it rest for a few minutes.
- 4 Heat oil about an inch to cover the pan. A wok is usually good but a heavy bottom frying pan also does the job.
- 5 Once the oil is smoking reduce the heat and then gently spoon a tablespoon of the batter into the hot oil. Careful to regulate the temperature, if it's too hot it will remain raw inside and burn outside too cold and you get greasy pakoras. Should take about 3 minutes on each side.

6 Drain on a kitchen towel and serve hot with ketchup or a mint and yoghurt sauce.

Mint and Yoghurt Sauce

Blend together 1 clove of garlic, half a cup of mint leaves, salt and ½ cup of Greek yoghurt.

Serve chilled with pakoras

Milestones & Boundary Stones

Moira MacQuaide's history of Burpham









Turnpike roads were established by law from the 17th century, to allow the collection of tolls in order to maintain the roads. The first one through Guildford was in 1749, forming part of the London to Portsmouth route.

All Turnpike Trusts had to erect milestones every mile, to inform travellers how far they had to go. Tollgates were built so that Tollkeepers could collect the money.

In Burpham there was the Green Man Gate Tollhouse, located between New Inn Farm and the Anchor & Horseshoes pub on London Road, but it seems to have been demolished in the early 20th century.



The only surviving milestone near Burpham seems to be the one on the corner of London Road and Boxgrove Road, showing 1 mile to Guildford and 26 miles to Hyde Park Corner. But there was one between Orchard Road and Winterhill Way, showing 2 miles to Guildford and 27 to London – it was either lost during the building of houses, or is hidden under vegetation.



Boundary stones were used to mark town, or parliamentary, boundaries for tax and bye-law purposes. As boundaries changed over the years, so new boundary stones were put in place. The oldest stones in Guildford date back to the 18th century. In 1933 the Borough was made much larger, taking in what had been rural areas, and there is a stone outside Dillon Cottages, off Merrow Lane, that reads G.B.B. 1933.

Boundary stones were used to mark town, or parliamentary, boundaries for tax and bye-law purposes.


On London Road there is an early 19th century stone just after the Abbotswood estate, with a very helpful explanation attached to the fence behind it. This says that it marks the boundary between Guildford and Burpham, has been there since at least the 19th century and is shown on old maps as B.S. Pre-1920 it was the boundary between the Parishes of Stoke and Worplesdon, as the Parish of Burpham wasn't created until 1922 (Parish of Burpham with Sutton Green). Looking very closely the words Stoke and Worplesdon can just be seen on either side of the stone.

The 1912 map shows the Parliamentary and Municipal Boundary lines, almost opposite the Primitive Methodist Church (now The Old Chapel) on London Road. It also shows boundary stones on either side of the road, but there's only the one left now, at the end of Abbotswood.



Finally, a question. On the corner of the old London Road and Merrow Lane, by what is now a footpath but used to be the old London Road, a white stone can be found in amongst the vegetation. Is this another boundary stone? One day I'll find out and let you know!



Behind the picturesque Guildford castle, and its beautiful grounds, Castle Hill boasts the famous grade two listed building, The Chestnuts, acquired in 1868 by Charles Lutwidge Dodgson (more famously known by his pen name, Lewis Carroll) for his six sisters. By then, he had already written his first successful book, 'Alice's Adventures In Wonderland', and that same year he would begin writing its sequel, 'Through The Looking Glass'.

Born on January 27, 1832, in Daresbury, Cheshire, he and his ten siblings grew up in isolated villages in the English countryside with their father, Reverend Charles Dodgson, and mother, Frances Jane Lutwidge. As the eldest boy of the family, he was skilled at entertaining himself and his brothers and sisters, making up a number of games and telling imaginative stories. He attended Christ Church, Oxford and

graduated in 1854 with degrees in mathematics and classics. He was also a keen photographer, notably shooting pictures of actress Ellen Terry and poet Alfred Tennyson. After graduating, he stayed at Christ Church, and became a lecturer, teaching mathematics - a position he had sought. Although taking deacon's orders in 1861, Dodgson was never ordained a priest, as his stammer made preaching difficult.

If you take a walk through the castle grounds today, you might notice the locally famous statue of Alice in the moment she enters through the looking glass, reaching out towards the ruins of Guildford Castle.

Due to this stammer – which he referred to as his 'hesitation' - and

his position in the family, with eight younger siblings, he found it easier to talk to children, three of which were the children of Henry George Liddell, Christ Church's dean. The Liddell children - Lorina, Edith and Alice - held an important place in his affections. They were the only children at Christ Church whilst he tutored there. On July 4, 1862, he and his friend, Robinson Duckworth, took a boat from Oxford to Godstow along the Thames and picnicked on the bank. This is where Dodgson first recounted the story of 'Alice's adventures underground', revealing the story of a little girl called Alice who fell down a rabbit hole and travelled into a fantasy world.

The story was partially based on a picnic taken by the same party around two weeks earlier, when they all got caught in the rain. Both Alice and Duckworth remarked on how improved this story was from his

others, and Alice went as far as to plead with Dodgson to write it out. Not only did he handwrite it, he also illustrated it and presented it to her for Christmas in 1864. Within a year he had published it under the title of 'Alice's Adventures In Wonderland'.

Other marks of his links to Guildford are the March Hare pub near Guildford Castle, and The Mad Hatter hat shop.

While Dodgson lived in Oxford, he often visited his family in Guildford. Where he not only enjoyed holidaying, but also fully took part in local life. In many ways, Guildford was his perfect second home, even allowing a quick journey to parts of London he frequented. He became good friends with the headmaster of the local royal grammar school, and the banker who lived next door. He was often called upon to preach at St Mary's Church on Quarry street, which was, and still is, the oldest building in the town.

Another of Dodgson's pastimes was to take leisurely walks around the

castle grounds, where it is thought that he was inspired to write 'The Hunting Of The Snark'.

If you take a similar walk through the castle grounds today, you might notice the locally famous statue of Alice in the moment she enters through the looking glass, reaching out towards the ruins of Guildford Castle. The statue, 'Alice Through The Looking Glass' sits in the Alice Garden, just behind The Chestnuts. It was sculpted in 1990 by Jeanne Argent to memorialise Lewis Carroll and his famous sequel, 'Through The Looking Glass', which he wrote in Guildford within the year of procuring the family home. At the start of the book, Alice travels through the looking glass on the fireplace mantel, and finds a very different world, similar to how Dodgson and his family must have experienced a large change when moving to Guildford.

Any visitor to Guildford would notice Carroll's impact woven through the town, including two statues, one previously mentioned, and one on the bank of the river Wey. This second statue was sculpted by local artist Edwin Russell in 1984 and depicts the two sisters from the book – Alice watching as the white rabbit leaps towards the rabbit hole. Other marks of his links to Guildford are the March Hare pub near Guildford Castle, and The Mad Hatter hat shop.

Lewis Carroll is buried in The Mount cemetery, Guildford, where you can still find his grave today, under a pine tree to the left of the chapel.

Sadly, on January 14, 1898, Dodgson died of Pneumonia after a bout of influenza. He passed away at The Chestnuts, two weeks away from turning 66 years old, and was buried in The Mount cemetery, where you can still find his grave today, under a pine tree to the left of the chapel.

Carroll's remarkable imagination and nonsensical style has entertained generations of readers and influenced pop culture in countless ways, and Alice's stories continue to shape the world from their spiritual home in the town of Guildford.

Things to do in the garden in September.

- The evenings are now drawing in and Autumn is upon us so enjoy your garden whilst it is still at its peak.
- On dry sunny days seed from Annuals such as Alyssum, French Marigold and Tagetes canbe collected for sowing next Spring, do not collect the seed of FI Hybrids as the new plants will not be the same as the originals
- Continue to deadhead the flower border so that it will stay in bloom until the first frost.

The evenings are now drawing in and autumn is upon us so enjoy your garden whilst it is still at its peak.

No produce good blooms Dahlias need to be fed with a high potash liquid feed once a fortnight.

- No Cuttings of Fuchsia and Pelargonium can still be taken.
- Neep Camellias and Rhododendrons well watered to ensure good bud formation for flowering next Spring.
- Severgreen Hedges should be given a final trim before Winter.

Apply an autumn dressing to the lawn when rain is forecast.

- Naffodils and Narcissi should be planted this month or next for a good Spring display.
- A late sowing of Spinach and Turnip can still be made. Overwintering Onion Sets and Spring Cabbage should be planted out.
- Cut out the fruited canes of Loganberry and Raspberry.
- Apply an Autumn Dressing to the Lawn when rain is forecast

Things to do in the garden in October.

All tender plants and shrubs should be brought indoors at the first sign of frost and kept in a frost free place.

- Cut back and divide Herbaceous Perennials.
- Dahlias should be lifted and stored once they have been blackened by the frost.
- Neduce the height of Bush Roses to minimise root damage caused by wind rock during the winter months. Climbing Roses should be pruned with the remaining stems being tied to a wall or trellis.

Now is a good time to plant hedges. shrubs and trees.

- National Tulip Bulbs should be ordered or purchased for planting next month, remember that the bigger the bulb the larger the flower, prepared hyacinths and Narcissi 'Paperwhite' should be planted in pots for a Christmas display, mixed colour Hvacinths will not all flower at the same time.
- Neet Peas should be sown under glass at the end of the month.
- Now is a good time to plant Hedges, Shrubs and Trees.
