Sight for Surrey supports over 8,000 people in Surrey who are blind, vision impaired, Deaf, hard of hearing and deafblind. The charity was established in 1922 when we first started assisting vision impaired soldiers returning from war and we have continued to help people in Surrey with a sight and/or hearing loss.

Burpham's boundaries



Throughout its history, Burpham has changed its size and shape many times, and the boundary commission is proposing to change the borders again in June, in time for the next round of borough elections.

The final proposals – still to be signed off - will, if agreed, expand our boundaries to include the roads of Ganghill, Abbotswood, Westward Ho and Boxgrove Avenue.

The new roads are currently split among neighbouring wards, but it does make some sense to relocate them into Burpham because they share the same journeys, schools, shops and amenities as we do. It also brings the size of Burpham into line with national expectations at around 2500 residents per councillor. We will retain two councillors, therefore.

The residents of the 'new' roads enjoy a distinctive neighbourhood. Many of their houses are protected from inappropriate development by being in a conservation area since 2011. Abbotswood in particular is home to

many fine large arts-and-crafts houses built by the eminent architect Alfred Claude Burlingham, Several of us who live in Orchard Road or on the Sainsburys roundabout inhabit cottage versions of the Abbotswood houses. These were the 'affordable housing' of their day and have the same wooden beams, nooks and crannies, and wide rectangular leaded windows.

Burpham is facing fewer changes than some other wards. The plan is to merge Christchurch and Holy Trinity wards, and also Shalford and Pilgrims on the other side of town. Stoughton however will split in two, and Friary will be separated from St Nicolas.

Will the additional roads change the political balance of power in Burpham? Maybe. Although the new roads were resisted by the small number of people

who responded to the commission's draft proposals, Lib Dem councillor George Potter has accepted that they make sense.

Saints' Days

It's a busy couple of months for the saints as we have St David's day (Tues 1st) and St Patrick's day (Thurs 17th) in March and St George's day (Sat 23rd) in April.

Saint David's Dav

Saint David's Day is the feast day of Saint David, the patron saint of Wales, and falls on the date of his death (c. 589 AD) 1st March.

St. David, born in Caerfai, south west Wales into an aristocratic family, was a Welsh bishop of Mynyw (now St. Davids) during the 6th century.

The feast has been regularly celebrated since his canonisation in the12th century. It is not a national holiday, though there is strong support for it becoming a bank holiday in Wales. In the past, schools have taken a half-day holiday, which continues in some parts of Wales.

David's fame as a teacher and his asceticism spread among Celtic Christians of the time. He helped found about 12 monasteries and his foundation at Glyn Rhosyn became an important Christian shrine. (Cont. over)

Saint Patrick's Day

Saint Patrick's Day held on 17th March, the traditional date of the death of St. Patrick (c.385-461), the foremost patron saint of Ireland.

St. Patrick's Day was made an official Christian feast day in the early 17th century and commemorates St.

Patrick and the arrival of Christianity in Ireland and celebrates the heritage and culture of the Irish in general.

Celebrations generally involve public parades and festivals, céilís, and the wearing of green attire or shamrocks.

Historically the Lenten restrictions on eating and drinking alcohol were lifted for the day, which has encouraged and propagated the holiday's tradition of alcohol consumption.

St. Patrick's Day is a public holiday in the Republic of Ireland and Northern Ireland and is celebrated in more countries than any other national festival. There has been criticism of St. Patrick's Day celebrations for having become too commercialised and for fostering negative stereotypes of the Irish people.

St. Patrick was a 5th-century Romano-British Christian missionary and Bishop in Ireland. It is believed he was born in Roman Britain in the 4th century, to a wealthy Romano-British family. His father was a deacon and his grandfather was a priest in the Christian church. When young he was kidnapped by Irish raiders and taken as a slave to Gaelic Ireland. After 6 years God told Patrick to escape his captors and flee to the coast, where a ship would be waiting to take him home.

According to tradition, Patrick returned to Ireland, becoming a priest and converting the pagan Irish to Christianity. He spent many years evangelising in the northern half of Ireland and converted thousands.

Patrick's efforts were eventually turned into an allegory in which he drove 'snakes' out of Ireland, despite the fact that snakes were not known to inhabit the region.

Tradition holds that he died on 17th March and was buried at Downpatrick. Over the following centuries, many legends grew up around Patrick and he became Ireland's foremost saint.

Saint George's Day

George is the patron saint of England. His cross forms the national flag and features within the Union Flag of the United Kingdom. By the 14th century, the saint had been declared both the patron saint and the protector of the Royal Family.

It is thought that George was a Roman officer of Greek descent, martyred when sentenced to death for refusing to renounce his Christian faith.

The earliest documented mention of St. George in England comes from the Catholic monk the venerable Bede (c.673–735). English soldiers evoked St. George as a battle cry during the Hundred Years' War (1337–1453) and displayed his cross on their pennants. St. George's Day was a major feast and national holiday in England on a par with Christmas from the early 15th century. But this tradition had waned by the end of the 18th century after the union of England and Scotland.

Similar to St. David's Day in Wales, there is a growing reaction to the recent indifference to St. George's Day.

Organisations such as English Heritage and the Royal Society of St. George have been encouraging celebrations, and arguments have been made to make St. George's Day a public holiday.

England, Ethiopia, Georgia, Moscow, Catalonia & Aragon in Spain have

all claimed George as their patron saint, as have several other regions, cities, universities, professions and organisations.

George and the dragon

First recorded in the 11th century, the legend tells of a fierce dragon causing panic in the city of Silene, Libya. To stop the dragon from devastating the city the people sacrificed two sheep each day to him. But sheep were not enough and they were forced to sacrifice humans instead. Eventually the king's daughter was chosen but no one was willing to take her place. George saved the girl by slaying the dragon with his lance. The king was so grateful that he offered him treasures as a reward for saving his daughter's life, but George refused and instead he gave these riches to the poor. The people of the city were so amazed at what they had witnessed that they became Christians and were all baptised.

The bones of Saint George are buried in the Church of Saint George, Lod, Israel.

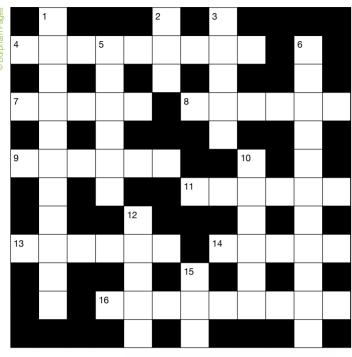

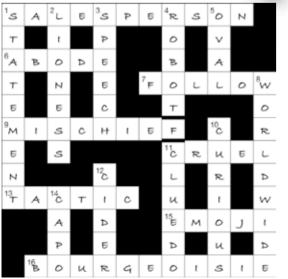

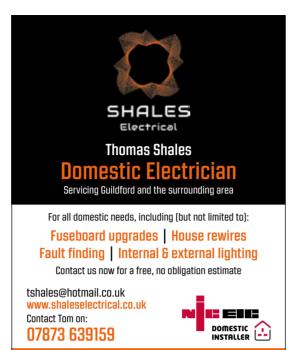
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How do you deal with loss?

How do you deal with disappointment or loss? All of us are different and there are many different various approaches we can take.

There's the 'let it all hang out' grieving version – we've all met someone like that. You know exactly how hard they are finding every second. And of course the pyschologists tell us that it is great to let our emotions out... but it can be a little too much for the poor unfortunate souls around us! Perhaps you lean towards the letting it all hang out method? Maybe we are tempted to wallow in our grief and somehow peversely not be prepared to leave the misery?

Or perhaps you are more the British stiff upper lip type? Don't let anyone around you know how much you are crying inside and just carry on as normal. This was probably the approach of choice for many from earlier generations. I guess the 'Keep calm and carry on' movement stems from this approach. There's a lot to be said for it, especially if you're in a war – but the science now tells us that not dealing with grief and trying to stuff it in or pretend it isn't there, isn't actually very healthy and can cause us physical problems in the long run.

It's not a subject that children's films usually tackle, but those who saw the movie Up, may agree with me that it was a brilliant, if emotional, study in grief and loss. It's not often you need

tissues in the first 10 minutes of a Disney Pixar film – but this one was brilliant! (Do check it out if you haven't seen it, it really does work for all ages!)

Grief is like the bear hunt – you can't go over it, you can't go round it, you have to go through it.

After the extraordinary last couple of years, many of us have experienced loss and grief in unexpected ways. There have been funerals that only a few people could attend. Elderly relatives in care homes whom we couldn't visit, School proms, end of year celebrations - normal human connections and experiences that were lost for ever. I wonder if we recognise the depth of the trauma we as individuals and as a nation have been through over the last few years. Perhaps these are first world problems - we have not experienced anything like the devastation of Syria or the suffering of Afghanistan. But we do ourselves a disservice if we don't allow ourselves space and time to acknowledge and grieve people and situations. Grief is like the bear hunt - you can't go over it, you can't go round it, you have to go through it. I wonder what that will look like for you?

This March we have an opportunity for those who'd like to pause and remember those they have lost with others. On **Sunday 6th March** we have a **Bereavement Service**, **3.00pm at St Luke's Church**. Maybe it will be a helpful way for you to go through your grief whether your loss was recent or a long time ago.

And as Easter approaches it is good to remember that the Christian faith is very real about pain and suffering. The Christian God is one who enters into our pain and walks our path. He is ready to hear our questions and hold our hurt. He can deal with our questions, our frustrations and our anger. Why not come and explore some of those things on the Unanswered Prayer Course that we are running in conjunction with 3 other local churches. You never know - maybe this will be the place that you need to go to move on from that place of grief that traps you. Whatever your way to deal with loss - can I encourage you to face it as the saying goes, we can run but we can't hide!

Flood Forum date change

The meeting scheduled for the 21st January had to be postponed due to concerns over the rise in Omicron infections. It will now take place on Friday March 25th at 1pm in the Village Hall. If you wish to attend, or raise a specific issue, please email secretary@burphamca.org.uk

For any new residents, the Flood Forum came about because of the 2013/2014 floods. The BCA established a flood action group of local residents to try and identify the problems of local surface water management and propose solutions. Together with the various agencies responsible for these issues this led to the formation of a Forum chaired by our MP which meets normally biannually.

The main areas of concern are:

- Issues along the Merrow Common Stream which flows from Merrow Lane through Great Oaks Park and Weybrook Park to its outlet into the Wey Navigation
- the erosion of the banks along the Wey Navigation.

The latter problem was the focus of a walkabout on a miserable January afternoon. Two members of the BCA



Committee, accompanied by Angela Richardson MP and representatives from GBC and the National Trust took a close up look at some of the issues we have raised. Erosion is one of the main concerns; it is happening on both sides of the river and much of the tow path has been lost.

Another worry is the number of mature trees lost. There were 207 reported blockages between Godalming and the Thames in the last 10 years; with other trees falling away from the river that could be up to 300 lost

trees, including quite a few along Burpham's stretch. There is also concern over the Nature Reserve and the rest of the flood plain not draining properly; this could lead to unwanted flooding in other places.

It was agreed that these issues need to be addressed and we look forward to what the agencies involved have to say at the Flood Forum this month. The committee would like to thank Angela and the representatives for giving their time and enduring a cold, wet and muddy walk.

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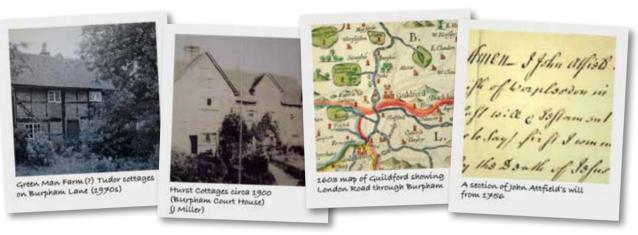
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Sometimes it is possible to find a family that lived in a community for not only decades, but centuries. The 'Attfield alias Ripley' family is one of these. Whilst Attfield was originally 'At-the-fields', later 'Atte Felde' or 'Atefeld' it's not known where the 'alias' extension of the name originated, but variations (and there are many different ones) could date back to Saxon times.

Moira MacQuaide's history of Burpham

It's possible that one of the surnames was adopted as a condition of inheritance, or to show a relationship to a prominent local family. Research shows that most of this family lived in Surrey, and there are baptism records dating back to the 1500s at Worplesdon. Some of these early records show that the family lived in Burpham, which was then part of Worplesdon Parish. There are other records of the wider Attfield family in Farnham, Windlesham, Chobham and Egham. Here are just a few examples of the family, mainly from probate records:

Agnes Atffylde alias Rypley of Burgham, a widow, left an interesting will when she died in 1574. She left 12 dozen loaves, six cheeses and a kilderkin of beer for her wake, and money for the poor of Worplesdon and Merrow. Amongst a long list of bequests to family and servants, her godchildren received 6d each, a servant received

various clothing and a calf, one of her sons received a bullock, some sheets, a chest, a pot and kettle, and some barley. The rest of her belongings went to her other sons.

In 1581 some land at Burpham, possibly around Pimm's Row or near the Green Man, was transferred to Thomas Atfeild alias Ripley for 1,000 years, by Edmund Windsor of Hillesden, who had inherited the Lordship of the Manor of Burpham in 1566. When Thomas died he left the property to his wife, Alice.

Henry Attfeild alias Ripley died in 1629, leaving his house and land at Burpham Cross, presumably by the Green Man & possibly the Tudor cottages (now West Court), and land in Ganghill, to his son.

John Attfield alias Ripley died in 1754. He was the Victualler, or innkeeper, at the Green Man in Burpham, giving us the earliest record of the pub being in the village. He had three children, but he asked his cousin, Henry Attfield alias Ripley, to sell everything in order to pay for the children's upkeep after his death.

In 1756 Thomas Atfield alias Ripley wanted his property at Hurst, now Burpham Court House and Willow Grange, to be sold in order to pay off his mortgage for Queenhithe Farm in Jacob's Well, so that his wife could live there for the rest of her life.

By the 1841 census it seems that the family had left Burpham, though there were still members living in other parts of Worplesdon parish. Nowadays New Inn Farmhouse is the only building in Burpham that the Attfields would have known, but there are several still in Jacob's Well.

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things everyone (but especially women!) should be doing

When it comes to our health and fitness, it's easy to become overwhelmed. The options are endless and it can be tricky to know where to start. Christine Sciberras, Founder and Head Coach at Melita Fitness, gives us some tips on how to make some small but effective changes to our fitness.

So let me help! Here's three things we should all be focussing on.

1. Lift heavy stuff

There are many reasons for this: resistance training helps you build lean muscle, it helps you build stronger bones and it helps you burn more calories.

For women it's especially important as we lose 5% of our muscle mass every decade. And that starts in our 30s!

We need to work to reverse this atrophy so that we can continue living full and active lives.

The way to achieve this is resistance training - lifting heavy stuff. You don't need fancy equipment or complex movements. In our classes, we use a kettlebell (or two!) and simple but effective exercises, like squats and lunges. This method of exercising gives your body a clear signal that it needs to adapt and build stronger muscles.

But don't worry, you're unlikely to become 'too muscular' by accident! Unless you happen to be The Rock's long-lost sister!

And the good news is that you don't even need much time. A recent study found that 1 to 2 hours per week means you are 1/3 less likely to become obese.

2. Eat proper food

We live in an obesogenic environment. Our food is designed to be easily accessible, extremely palatable, and easy to consume. Millions of £££s go into developing this kind of food and making it irresistible.

This ultra-processed food is exactly the type of food we should be eating less of. Although ironically it takes up around 80% of a supermarket's floor space.

We should instead be eating more vegetables, fruit, nuts, pulses, and good sources of protein too.

3. Prioritise rest

Now I know that for some of you with young children, this might seem impossible. But let me tell you why this is important.

When you lift heavy stuff, you damage your muscles. This is the signal your body needs to build back stronger. And this building can only happen when you are resting.

The other reason is this:

bad sleep = unbalanced hormones. especially the hormones that regulate satiety and cravings.

So you see without good sleep you'll strugale to grow stronger. And you'll struggle to make healthy food choices.

So prioritise your sleep: put your phone away, leave the tidying, switch off the telly. And get yourself to bed early instead.

Whenever you're making changes to your lifestyle, I recommend starting with the smallest possible change.

Pick one thing: like going to bed earlier or starting an exercise class. Focus on this one thing and stick with it until it becomes engrained.

Avoid overhauling too much in one go. Instead pick something so small, that you cannot fail to achieve it. Because once you achieve it, you'll feel amazing.

Things to do in the garden in March.

Shallots and Onion sets should be planted this month and if it is mild Early Potatoes can be planted towards the end of the month.

Most vegetable seed can now be sown outdoors if it is mild in prepared beds.

- If you did not do so last month you can still sow Aubergines, Cucumbers, Sweet Peppers and Tomatoes in a heated propagator or indoors.

When conditions are dry the lawn should be cut with the mower blades on a high setting for the first few cuts...

Cut back last years Autumn fruiting Raspberry canes to ground level, prune Blueberries and

- Gooseberries and apply a dressing of a balanced fertiliser or Sulphate of Potash at 15g per sq m.
- Bush and Standard Roses should be pruned and fed with a Rose Fertiliser.
- Continue to prune Summer Flowering Shrubs and Dogwoods.
- When conditions are dry the lawn should be cut with the mower blades on a high setting for the first few cuts, Weed and Feed with Mosskiller should be applied just before rain is forecast.

Things to do in the garden in April.

- Second Early Potatoes should be planted in the first half of the month, Maincrop Potatoes can be planted in the second half.
- Beetroot, Carrots, Leeks, Lettuce, Radish, Spring Onions and Turnip can all be sown outdoors now.
- Brassicas should be sown in small pots ready for transplanting later in the Summer.
- Plant out Broad Beans which were sown indoors.

Tomato seedlings which have developed their first true leaves should be potted up. Plant Summer flowering bulbs such as Gladioli.

Plant out Broad Beans which were sown indoors.

- Remove faded Daffodil and Tulip flowers leaving the foliage to die back.
- Deadhead Pansy and other Spring bedding plants to encourage continuous flowering. Prune Forsythia immediately after flowering.
- Cut back Lavender to keep the plant bushy but do not cut into old wood.

Continue to apply Lawn Weed and Feed with Mosskiller as necessary.

- In the Greenhouse sow bedding plants such as French Marigold for a Summer display.
- Continue to apply Lawn Weed and Feed with Mosskiller as necessary.
- Start checking for and controlling Slugs, Snails and Aphids.

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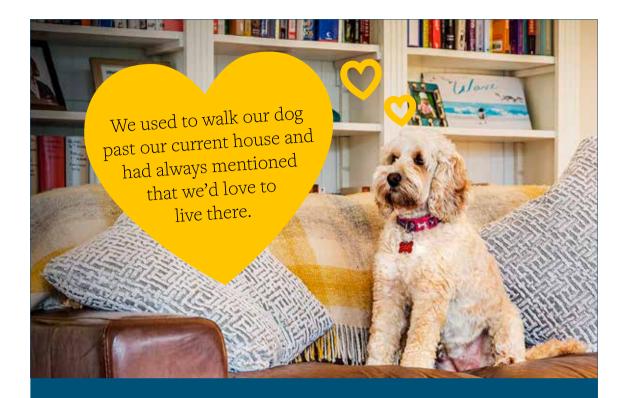
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
