



Challengers charity launches Big Play Appeal campaign to build an accessible playground for disabled children.



A new quarter of a million-pound state-of-the art playground which would transform the lives of thousands of disabled children is due to be built in Guildford.

The campaign, **Big Play Appeal**, is being launched by local disability charity, **Challengers**, which has provided more than 40 years of fun and accessible play for children of all ages.

The playground's design, inspired by the Surrey Hills, will be a multi-functional space with specialist equipment aimed at facilitating fun and adventure for disabled children and will be built at the Challengers Guildford Playcentre in Stoke Park.

When not in use Challengers will be looking to open the centre up for **Family Fun Days**, for local families to enjoy together. It is an exciting opportunity to build a space bringing disabled and non-disabled children together, where they can make friends and learn from each other.

"Our new playground will benefit the community as a whole, bringing us a step closer to achieving our vision of a world where all children and young people can play together, freely." Gen Dearman, CEO

The support of the local community and businesses is crucial to the playground's development. Challengers have launched a major crowdfunding campaign to help fund the cost of the project and to reach the huge target of £250,000 and start the playground build. Challengers need the support of the community to donate, fundraise and spread awareness of their Big Play Appeal.

Parents whose children attend Challengers are really excited about the new play-ground and the difference it will make to their children's lives: 'Children with disabilities deserve opportunities to access play. This is currently something we lack in Surrey. This playground will allow children who use Challengers and families in Surrey to play in a safe and secure area. Parents will feel comfortable and safe when allowing their children to play in this new playground, this is often something they can't feel in other playgrounds in Surrey'. According to research from the disability equality charity **Scope** "Half of families with disabled children in the UK, face accessibility problems with their local playground." The new Challengers playground will provide a place where children and young people can play freely, with equipment to suit a wide range of needs, as well as opening up an opportunity for local families to use the space and benefit from inclusive play.

Guildford MP Angela Richardson said, "I have had the pleasure of visiting Guildford Challengers and have seen the positive impact Challengers has on children, young people, and their families. It is clear that the children love to attend Challengers and get so much out of the centre, but it is missing a vital element, an inclusive and accessible playground for all to enjoy. Disabled children and young people are so often excluded from society, including local playgrounds, so to have access to a specially designed playground is invaluable to the disabled community and their families."





Burpham was probably chosen as a suitable place to settle over two thousand years ago due to its proximity to water – the River Wey. Since then, we have seen changes in the climate and the way we use resources, that have affected water levels across the country.


At the time of writing this, there are reports in the media of proposed hosepipe bans in Southern England and there have been wildfires on common ground due to the recent very hot weather. [Note from Editor: Moira originally wrote this article for the previous issue of the magazine but this was switched with the article for our 100th issue.] July was recorded as the driest since 1911. Will 2022

be remembered in the same way as the 'heatwave of 1976'? Do you remember queueing to use standpipes in the street that summer? We need the 'right sort of rain' in order to refill aquifers and reservoirs.

However, with the ground so dry and hard, any rain is likely to run off as surface water, with the risk of flash flooding. Old maps show that areas of Burpham were deemed to be 'Liable to Flooding', especially south of Burpham Court Farm and along Clay Lane. In 2013 there was significant flooding over the fields and roads, when Burpham was recognised by Guildford Borough Council as a flooding hotspot. More recently, in 2020 Surrey was battered by Storm Dennis. Another area prone to flooding is the stream that runs down

the back of gardens in **Great Oaks Park**, now named **Merrow Common Stream**. This runs between culverts

at London Road and Gosden Hill Road. According to the riverlevels.uk website, the water in the stream has been at a steady level this year, but it reached its highest level on Christmas Eve 2013.

The ford between Dairyman's Walk and Ladygrove Drive can fill guickly, taking drivers by surprise - sometimes leading to them being swept away by the water. The cul-de-sac of **Burpham** Lane, in front of Burpham Primary School, used to flood regularly, due to blocked drains. Luckily that problem was resolved by making a hole in the acoustic fence to allow water to drain away! Sewers often cannot cope with heavy rainfall, and blocked drains need to be cleared. Riverside Nature Reserve has a man-made lake and ditches, as well as the towpath, both of which need maintenance in order to prevent problems.

What will the coming months bring us?

What is the Flood Forum?

The Flood Forum had its origin in a Surface Water Management report

commissioned by Guildford Borough Council around 2012 which revealed Burpham as a flooding hotspot – proved very omniscient by the floods of 2013/2014. The Burpham Community Association (BCA) formed a sub committee, the Flood Action Group, which initially became part of the Worplesdon Flood Forum. However, it soon became clear that Burpham had enough issues to form its own Flood Forum. This brings together all the relevant agencies

- SCC, GBC, Thames Water, the Environment Agency and the National Trust and meets annually. Our MP, Angela Richardson chairs the Forum meetings. Members of the Flood Action Group have prepared an Action Plan which gives details of all the main concerns, who is responsible, what action is needed and when it is completed. They meet several times a year to update the Action Plan.

The typical recent level of the Merrow Common Stream at Burpham over the past 12 months has been between 0.79m and 0.93m. It has been between these levels for at least 150 days in the past year.

The highest level ever recorded at the Merrow Common Stream at Burpham is 2.09m, reached on Tuesday 24th December 2013 at 10:45pm.

Note that this data may not take account of recent measurements, as we wait until a level has been verified by the Environment Agency before adding it to our records.

Hedgehogs Rule!

Back in 2020, Sainsburys lodged an application to extend their store which threatened a Local Green Space and its resident hedgehogs, now officially classed as vulnerable mammals. Many local people objected, as did one very well known non-resident. Brian May, co-founder of a hedgehog charity, Amazing Grace. The hedgehogs won the day! We asked Elizabeth Lee to tell us about these enchanting animals.




I am a volunteer for several wildlife charities. I am especially passionate about hedgehogs and trying to help the declining population in Burpham and Merrow. Through my Facebook page 'Hedgehogs of Burpham and Merrow', I try to offer advice and assistance to anyone that has hedgehogs in their garden or if they

find a hedgehog in need of any help. It is lovely to be able to share local hedgehog stories and to try and make a difference in our community. I would love to hear of any new sightings, as I am aware of hedgehogs on Weybrook Park, especially the Devoil Close area, Gosden Hill, Bushy Hill and Merrow Park. A few remain around the London Road area and in Jacobs Well, but sadly the population mostly seems to have disappeared on Weylea Farm.

To encourage our prickly friends into your garden, there are lots of things that you can do. Hedgehogs are lactose intolerant and must never be given milk. Plenty of fresh water and meaty cat food in jelly or kitten biscuits, can be a life saver, and will mean that your prickly friend will keep on visiting you.

The key piece of information that I give to people is that hedgehogs are nocturnal, and if out in the day they are likely to be sick or injured. Unfortunately a lot of people do not realise this, so it is always best to call your local wildlife rescue, The Wildlife Aid Foundation in Leatherhead on 01372 360404 for advice. Never try to care for a sick hedgehog yourself as they are extremely complex little creatures.



Other important suggestions would be to make your garden as hedgehog friendly as possible, for example creating hedgehog highways for free roaming between gardens, checking areas before using any garden machinery or before lighting bonfires, creating ramps in ponds, eliminating the use of chemicals and keeping netting off the ground. Making your neighbours aware of the presence of hedgehogs is also very important and indeed also the parks team at the council if they cut back areas locally where

they could be nesting. Hedgehogs can have two litters of babies per year, typically of up to six hoglets.

Not all hedgehogs hibernate now, due to climate change, and autumn iuveniles need to be of a certain weight to survive the winter. From October, any hoglet under 200 grams needs to go to rescue. Any between 200-400 grams please call your local rescue for advice or feel free to message me through my Facebook page. Any over 400 grams looking healthy, out at night, please help with supplemental feeding. At any weight, if out in the daylight, circling, wobbling, sunbathing, injured or with fly strike (looks like grains of rice) please seek help straight away.

Hedgehogs have faced a huge decline in population over the last sixty years, but together we can work to increase their numbers and make our gardens a safe haven for them. I look forward to seeing any new members on the Facebook page and anyone is welcome to join even if further afield.



Guildford, known for its picturesque town centre, is rich in charming scenes and unassuming treasures. Among these are a number of carefully crafted art pieces, each of which has a story of its own.

Perhaps the most well-known of these is the grand statue of George Abbot, Archbishop of Canterbury, erected in April of 1993 at the top of the high street. It was sculpted by local artist Faith Winter, who studied at the Guildford School of Art, and unveiled by Robert Runcie, the then Archbishop of Canterbury. Born in Guildford, 1562, Abbot attended the Royal Grammar School and went on to teach at Oxford University. He was three times Vice-Chancellor of the university and took a leading role in translating the authorised version of the New Testament. Guildford continues to honour Abbot with a hospital, a pub, a secondary school and the towering statue. His tomb can be visited at Holy Trinity Church.

Another recognisable sculpture of Guildford Town Centre rests at the bottom of the high street. The 'Surrey Scholar' depicts a young man holding a number of books and raising his mortarboard hat in a lively running position. It was commissioned for the Golden Jubilee by the University of Surrey, also coinciding with the University's 35th anniversary. It had the

brief of a 'dynamic' feel and was raised in 2009, a feat of engineering, as the Scholar balances on one toe on a sloping site. The 11-foot high, bronze sculpture was created by Alan Sly to represent education in Guildford. Interestingly, Alan Sly also sculpted the eye-catching 'Surrey Stag' outside the University – designed to represent its logo.

When we take a moment to notice the talent around us and appreciate our local environment, we may be surprised at what we find.

Erected in 2017 and distinctly recognisable, anyone who frequents Sutherland Memorial Park must be familiar with the 'Sutherland Circle'. This creative steel art piece aims to explore themes of nature; each leaf-shaped structure is ornately decorated with individual natural scenes, including a bird flying over a child in a flower meadow or a robin surrounded by falling autumnal leaves. The structures surround a small cylindrical column with a plaque. It was created by artist Steve Tomlinson in close collaboration with a local school.


'The Bargeman', an intriguing sculpture located on Town Wharf, was commissioned by the Guildford Borough Council to celebrate the millennium. Facing the canal, a working man made of steel coils wears a flat cap and coat and stands in a position to throw a length of looped rope. It was created in 2001 by Andy Quirk and Robert Kranenborg at Utopia Forge and designed to reflect the time when the Wey was a working river.

The Wey itself is a waterway of almost 20 miles connecting Godalming and Surrey with the Thames at Weybridge. The river Wey Navigation was created between 1651 and 1653 to offer Guildford merchants a convenient highway to London. It is one of the oldest river navigations in the country, and today the National Trust manages it as a leisure waterway.

So, it is safe to say that the bargeman represents an important aspect of historical life in Guildford and celebrates the gateway of local trade.

The newest significant public art piece in Guildford is the **war memorial** at the castle grounds (erected in 2018 and

created by David Annand) honouring the lives of the eighteen residents of the town who have died in service since the end of World War 2. The bronze memorial depicts a young man in military uniform holding a plaque engraved with the names of those who died. The figure is surrounded by three arcs, which represent the three services and echo the Norman Architecture of Guildford Castle.

Public art in Guildford, however. doesn't end there; a number of other pieces can be found throughout Guildford. Lewis Carroll's impressive influence can certainly be sensed throughout the town for example, with 'Alice through the looking glass' and 'Alice and the White Rabbit' exemplifying local art. Outside the Odeon cinema, you may well have seen the only wooden sculpture on this list, 'Rising Stars', by Steve Geliot, perhaps a cheerful tribute to the stars on the big screen. Other art pieces include the extract from an Edgar Allen Poe poem on the side of the Parkway Premier Inn, the dancing figures sculpture on the wall of the

youth centre at Haydon Place, many interesting statues on the grounds of Surrey University, and, more locally, the green man sculpture on the side of the Burpham Aldi, paying respect to the Green Man pub which stood in the location previously.

Clearly, many creative and captivating gems surround us whilst we go about our daily lives. When we take a moment to notice the talent around us and appreciate our local environment, we may be surprised at what we find.

In 2016 I grew an abundance of tomatoes and by September I was left with a lot of unripe ones. I experimented with my Mum's runner bean pickle recipe from the 1970s and gave my brother, Tony, a few jars of the resulting, yummy green tomato chutney. He served some in baquettes and ploughman's lunches in his Wiltshire deli. One customer liked it so much he asked if he could buy a jar. Tony replied, "I don't have any to sell, my sister makes it, I'll ask her." The next few times the same guy came into the shop he asked, "Have you got any of your sister's chutney?" ...and so, my brand name was born!

I did a lot of research, got qualified in food safety and hygiene, had our kitchen and practices inspected by Guildford Borough Council (which wasn't as scary as you might think!), and started making chutney to sell at fairs and farm shops. Since then, I have extended the range of chutneys and added jams, marmalade, mustard

and other products depending on the season.

Things to do in the garden in November.

- The Planting of Tulips should be completed by the end of this month.
- Cut down faded perennials leaving Penstemon and other late flowering perennials to continue flowering.
- Dahlias and Cannas can still be lifted and stored in a dry place if you do not want to risk frost damage by overwintering them in the ground. They should be lifted, dried and stored in a frost free place ready for planting next Spring, if they are being overwintered in the ground they should be covered with a mulch dressing.
- Apply an application of a mulch dressing to protect Agapanthus from the frost.
- Half hardy Fuchsias and Pelargoniums should be cut back and brought undercover, reduce watering so that they remain dormant during the winter months.

- The watering of Houseplants should be reduced as the nights draw in.
- Amaryllis bulbs should be potted up for Christmas flowering.
- Bring potted Hyacinths into a light cool area once they begin to shoot.
- Reduce the watering of Houseplants.

Continue to rake fallen leaves off of the lawn.

- Now is a good time to plant Raspberry Canes, Fruit Trees and Bushes.
- Start the winter pruning of Apple and Pear trees.
- Aquadulce Broad Beans should be planted now to produce an early crop ahead of the Spring invasion of Blackfly.
- Garlic cloves and overwintering Onion Sets can still be planted.
- Continue to rake fallen leaves off of the lawn.

Things to do in the garden in December.

Indoor Azaleas should be watered frequently to prevent the dense root ball from drying out, rainwater is better than tap water.

- Poinsettias are a popular gift at this time of the year, they should be kept in a warm light place away from draughts, they do not like to be overwatered. All other Houseplants should be kept in a bright place as winter light levels fall on frosty nights do not leave them trapped between closed curtains and the window.
- Pinch out the tips of Sweet Peas sown in October to encourage bushy growth.
- The vegetable plot should be cleared of all left over plant debris and lightly dug over to open up the ground so that the winter frost can get in and destroy bugs and diseases.
- Rhubarb crowns can be forced by covering them with dark bucket.
- Grape vines, Acers and Birches should be pruned before Christmas to prevent bleeding, most decidious trees can now be cut back, leave Prunus species until they are in leaf next Spring, Magnolias should be left until the Summer
- Keep off of the Lawn when it is frosty or very wet.
