

London Road Active Travel Scheme

The first meeting of the 'Burpham to Guildford Sustainable Travel Scheme – Stakeholder Reference Group (STRG)' was held on March 27th. The meeting was chaired by Councillor Matt Furniss and facilitated by The Consultation Institute (a not-for-profit organisation who aim to spread good practice in engagement activities).

Surrey County Council representatives stated their wish for a fresh start and a constructive engagement process. They repeated that the scheme will not require lengthy closures and that the carriageway will mostly be wider than the 3 metres previously announced. They hope that a consensus in favour of the revised scheme will be achieved.

The purpose of the Stakeholder Reference Group is to ensure that stakeholder views are understood and properly considered during the engagement process. It will provide a forum for dialogue between Surrey County Council (SCC) and its stakeholders, at each key stage of the scheme.

Local councillors, residents associations and representatives of schools & students, cyclists, disabled people and businesses were invited to contribute to the design of the process.

It is proposed that the process will include a series of meetings, a public survey and two workshops looking at details of the proposed design and implementation plan.

The BCA is contributing to this process through **Guildford Residents**Association (GRA) and London
Road Action Group (LRAG).

Guildford Fringe Festival celebrates 10th birthday with free events in town centre.

A jam-packed programme of arts events is taking place in venues in and around Guildford from 24 June to 15 July 2023 as Guildford Fringe Festival celebrates its tenth anniversary.

Founder Nick Wyschna wanted to bring a multi-arts experience to the town which gave people the opportunity to try out different events, so he launched **Guildford Fringe Festival** in 2013 with just one venue and 33 shows.

It has grown ever since and last year professional and amateur performers put on 137 events in nine venues, entertaining thousands of people, many who come back year after year.

The Festival is multi-genre and features theatre, comedy, art, spoken word, film, workshops and children's shows, some of which are free of charge.

On 24 June, the Guildhall balcony becomes the stage for 'Opera on the Balcony' with arias and duets from well-loved composers including Puccini and Mozart and on 8 July, the sound turns vintage with close harmony trio,

Bluebirds performing to the High Street.

People can do their own singing on 1 July with a guided stroll around the town centre during 'Sing When You're Walking'. Song leaders will be on hand and there will be a few surprises on the way!

Managing Director, Charlotte Wyschna said: 'It's felt especially important to us this year to have events which are free to attend so do come along and enjoy some top-quality entertainment in the town centre. There are so many other acts as well – we expect a lot of fun, laughter and drama over the three weeks so this is an opportunity to take a risk and experience something you wouldn't usually see.'







GBC Election Hustings

Elections for Guildford Borough Council will take place on 4th May 2023. This will be the first election where photo ID will be required to vote in person. It will also be the first election to include Abbotswood, Ganghill and Boxgrove Avenue in Burpham ward, The next elections for Surrey County Council will be in 2025.

A Hustings for the GBC election was arranged by the BCA and held on March 23rd at the Village Hall. It was attended by all the candidates we know are standing in Burpham ward. These are, in alphabetical order, Conservative (Adam Heilbron and Christian Holliday). Labour (lan Creese), Liberal Democrat (George Potter and Jane Tyson) and Residents for Guildford and Villages (Charles

Wilce and Liz Hyland).

Candidates were given the opportunity to speak, reply and then answer guestions from the audience. They were asked to stick to their vision for Burpham and Guildford and avoid national and party politics.

With the application of the Chair's vellow card, some of the candidates followed these rules all the time and all the candidates followed them some of the time.

The Q & A session was lively and occasionally heated. Too many commitments and hopes were expressed to cover here, but all candidates did commit to holding regular 'surgeries' to enable residents to pass on questions, requests and opinions.



Sutherland Memorial Hall

The BCA is an active member of the group seeking to establish **Burpham Community Hub as** a legal entity to manage **Sutherland Memorial Hall.**

Following the rejection of our expression of interest, a constructive meeting was held with GBC and, by the time this is published a revised bid will have been submitted. We are very hopeful that this will be successful and the hall available for community use again within the next few months.

Disabled Parking



You may have read some recent correspondence on Next Door (Burpham) concerning parking

issues for disabled people using Parent and Child (PC) spaces; one such incident led to a disabled driver being verbally abused. Blue Badge (BB) holders should be aware that it is for on street parking; off street areas such as supermarkets are covered by separate rules and these need to be checked. Many do allow use of PC spaces by BB holders if all disabled spaces are occupied, Sainsburys for one. Unfortunately there are always those who abuse the system - an inquiry three years ago revealed that some 20% of badges were being used fraudulently, costing local authorities millions of pounds. Misuse, where identified, can lead to a hefty fine. If you think someone is trying to abuse the system, please be courteous and don't make assumptions. Not all disabilities are immediately obvious but anyone with a genuine BB has gone through a pretty rigorous investigation. You can contact Surrey County Council if you have real concerns.

One more point for the able-bodied – please don't be tempted to use a disabled space just because it's empty and you'll only be a few minutes.

Moira MacQuaide's history of Burpham

A couple of years ago this column focused on the plan to cut down over 60 trees by Sainsbury's, but this time the focus is on farming and housing and the land that eventually made way for the Sainsbury's superstore.

The name of Bower's Farm was first mentioned in the 1881 census, but Bower's Mill had its name from at least the early 18th century. Farmland changed owners and tenants fairly regularly, and many farms changed

their boundaries as the landlords bought and sold their lands. We know that William Francis Pimm, who lived at Marlyn's, farmed the area between Burpham Court Farm and London Road in the early 19th century, but after his death in the 1840s it was split up. Bower's Farm was run by Arthur Pimm, Thomas Slaughter, George and Percy Gatley, Leo Keene and Dorothy (Keene) Jones over a period of about 100 years. Many of them ran more than one farm, some of which were a distance away from Burpham.

Percy Gatley was recorded in a newspaper in 1905 as being gored by a bull at the Guildford Cattle Market. Luckily, he survived the accident and went on farming in Burpham until 1959.

Gatley sold Bower's Farm in 1938 and the stock sold included 70 head of cattle, five cart horses, poultry and machinery. These sales show that the farm was mainly dairy but also encompassed some arable fields.

Leo Keene owned Gosden Hill Farm as well as leasing numerous other farms in the area. In 1945 there was an outbreak of foot and mouth disease and all his cattle, pigs and sheep had to be slaughtered.

All the cattle at Bower's Farm were given names beginning with a B, including a pedigree Guernsey bull called Burpham Colonel. In 1958 Leo's daughter Dorothy took over Bower's Farm, which was rented from the Duke of Sutherland and later Paul Getty. In the 1960s the farm was described as producing barley, and had 600 pigs as well as calves and poultry.

In 1970 Dorothy moved to Chippenham, taking the pigs with her. The farm was bought by Sainsbury's as the site for their new store. In 1974 Leo disappeared for eight days and eventually his body was found in the long grass by the river edge, believed to be Bower's Farm. It was suspected that he had fallen into the river to help an animal but then drowned because he had never learned to swim.

Planning applications for residential development on the farmland had been turned down in 1963, but in the 1980s Sainsbury's, Waitrose and Asda all wanted to build there.

Planning applications for residential development on the farmland had been turned down in 1963, but in the 1980s Sainsbury's, Waitrose and Asda all wanted to build there. Sainsbury's won the battle of the supermarkets,

but originally they had planned to also build a garden centre and Homebase store on the plot. Eventually they had just the supermarket, which opened in 1985, adding the petrol station in 1997.

Plans for a housing estate first appeared in 1982, and permission was given for Ideal Homes to build a mix of residential homes, and the Miller Group to build 66 dwelling houses with garages. Ideal Homes advertised two bedroom houses from £73,950 in 1987, offering "Country living in a sought after area". Miller Group advertised 2, 3 and 4 bedroom homes from £104,950 in 1990, stating "Two's company, three's a family, four's a move to Miller". Today Weybrook Park is a popular housing estate, with easy access to the A3 for commuters.

George Abbot's Gift to Guildford

Sitting at the top of the High Street in Guildford is a large 400 year old Grade 1 Listed Building which most passers-by hardly seem to notice. It is called Abbot's Hospital, but it is a beautiful Alms House, providing accommodation for the elderly poor of Guildford, just as it did when it was given to Guildford by George Abbot.

George Abbot was born in Guildford in 1562 and rose to be Archbishop of Canterbury. He was chosen for that role by his patron, James 1st, who had involved him in a number of projects including the translation of the Bible, and an attempt to merge the Church of England with the Church of Scotland.

In 1619 Guildford was suffering badly from the decline in the wool trade and George Abbot built the Hospital to provide shelter and work for the suffering townspeople. He had been the Vice Chancellor of Oxford University and copied the Tudor brick style he was familiar with from the colleges there. It only took two and a half years

to build, and the first residents arrived in 1622, 10 men and 8 women. The rules were strict: they were all over 60, single, poor, a resident of Guildford and of good character.

The residents were required to go to chapel twice a day and to church in Holy Trinity on Sundays and holidays.

Failure to attend could lead to admonishment, a fine and even expulsion.

Today the 28 residents are all over 60, largely from Guildford and 'of modest means'. Since the controversial building of the Lower Courtyard in the 1980s, the Hospital has been able to accommodate couples. Chapel is no longer mandatory but there are services every week. Whereas in the past residents would live out their lives there, now they must be capable of independent living. While there is still a Master and a Warden managing the Hospital, the days of assistant masters, assistant wardens, matrons and assistant matrons are past.

The original Upper Courtyard contains many wonderful original architectural features. Apart from the residents accommodation, there a number of common rooms. The Masters Lodge contains some exquisite woodpanelling. The Presence Chamber, which was once George Abbot's office when he was staying with his brother Richard whom he made the first Master, contains many historical artefacts including the original charter and George Abbot's handwritten rules for the residents. There is also a fine portrait of him.

Above the Presence Chamber in the Tower over the Gatehouse was the Treasurer's Office, accessible only by a stone spiral staircase. In 1685 it was thought to be the most secure room in Guildford, so it was there that the young Duke of Monmouth was imprisoned after his unsuccessful rebellion against James 2nd on his way back to London to be beheaded. It is now always known as the Monmouth Room.

In 1619 Guildford was suffering badly from the decline in the wool trade and George Abbot built the Hospital to provide shelter and work for the suffering townspeople.

The Common Room is where the residents used to take their meals, and still contains much of the original furniture as well as a wonderful collective portrait by renowned local artist Jane Allison of the residents in 2019.

The Chapel has always been a central part of the Abbot's community. Its simple interior is highlighted by beautiful stained glass windows recording the life of Jacob from the Bible. It is a tribute to George Abbot's patron James 1st.

At the back is the Garden once used to grow vegetables, but now a haven of tranquillity for the residents.

George Abbot's later life was blighted by a tragic accident when on a visit to his friend Lord Zouche he was persuaded to go hunting and accidentally killed a game keeper. His enemies in the church used the incident to attack his authority, and the divisions within the Church of England widened dramatically. It was a portent of the English Civil War to come.

George Abbot died in 1632 and is buried in Holy Trinity Church opposite in a splendid tomb which survived the collapse of that church one hundred years later.

Today the Hospital is an independent charity. It is home to 28 residents so access to the public is limited. There are guided tours (costing £5) at 11.00am every Thursday and Friday from Easter to October, and also on the first Tuesday of those months to coincide with the Farmers Markets on the High Street. The hospital also welcomes pre-arranged Group Tours.



garden in May.

The golden rule for this month is to be on guard for a late frost, do not plant out tender bedding plants until the end of the month, otherwise when a sharp frost appears you will be making an expensive return visit to the Nursery or Garden Centre.

- Dahlia plants and tubers should not be planted until at least the middle of the month.
- Name Allow Forget-me-nots to set seed before pulling up.
- Noses with a systemic insecticide to control Blackspot and Greenfly

Sweet Peas should be tied to supports as they climb.

There is still time to sow Courgettes and Squash, two seeds to a pot for planting out later, sow the seed standing on its edge for better germination.

Make small successional sowings of Salad Crops.

- Name of the French and Runner beans can now be sown outdoors.
- Leeks and Purple Sprouting should be sown for harvesting next winter.
- Pinch out the tips of Broad Beans to control Blackflv.
- Plant out Tomatoes towards the end of the month, remove side shoots from all types except Bush and small fruited varieties.
- Nake small successional sowings of Salad Crops.
- Name of the lawn frequently, apply a Spring and Summer dressing just before rain is forecast

Things to do in the garden in June.

- Prune Spring flowering shrubs such Forsythia and Philadelphus, Magnolias should be left until they are in full leaf.
- Fast growing Annuals such as Calendula should be sown where they are to flower.

- Pinch out the leading shoots of Chrysanthemum, Helianthus and Fuchsia to encourage bushy growth.
- Nead head Delphiniums and Lupins to encourage a second flush of bloom.
- Complete the planting of Summer Bedding plants, Cannas, Dahlias and Gladioli.
- Early Potatoes which have come into flower are ready for lifting.
- Sow French and Runner Beans for a late crop.




